Dec 1942:

School closed for Christmas, attendance for the last few weeks has been poor due to an outbreak of whooping cough. Lord Hylton attended the quarterly meeting and read out a letter from the Somerset Education Authority authorising the appointment of an assistant, salary offered £25-£35.

Dec 1942:

Duríng a blackout, one of the líghts ín the school came on due to a storm - the switch had been left in the 'on 'position by mistake.

Mr Draper paid a short visit to the school to discuss the fixtures which would need to be made before the school could start serving dinners.

Dec 1951:

The school inspectors visited in connection to the problems of staffing, and the proposed use of the dining room as a classroom once again.
