Knowledge Outcomes:

During Year 2 pupils should be taught to:

Locational knowledge

name and locate the world's seven continents and five oceans

Place knowledge

- understand geographical similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the United Kingdom, and of a small area in a contrasting non-European country Human and physical geography
- identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the United Kingdom and the location of hot and cold areas of the world in relation to the Equator and the North and South Poles
- use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to:
 - key physical features, including: beach, cliff, coast, forest, hill, mountain, sea, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation, season and weather
 - key human features, including: city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office, port, harbour and shop

Geographical skills and fieldwork

- use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the United Kingdom and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans studied at this key stage
- use simple compass directions (North, South, East and West) and locational and directional language [for example, near and far; left and right], to describe the location of features and routes on a map
- use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic human and physical features; devise a simple map; and use and construct basic symbols in a key

Learning Journey:

- •I can understand where Kenya is in the world.
- •I can locate Kenya on a world map.
- •I can understand what life is like for people living in Kenya.
- •I can understand what a national park is.
- I can use compass directions to describe places on a map.
- •I can understand some of the main animals which live in Kenya.
- •I can understand what Maasai culture is like.
- •I can observe photographs and ask questions to find out about a place.
- •I can compare my life to a child's life from Kenya

Wider Curriculum:

The children will be visiting Bristol Zoo, where they can explore some of the wildlife that exists in Kenya. While at the zoo, they will enjoy a 'hands on' African experience to develop their learning of African Animals further.
