Top differences between St Mary's CE Primary School and BaNES Primary

At the end of last term pupils at St Mary's took part in a SHEU (Schools Health Education Unit) survey. They were asked a number of questions around health beliefs and behavior. The report compares the data collected from our pupils with those from a larger, wider sample.

We were particularly pleased to note St Mary's pupils feel their views and opinions make a difference to decisions at school (87% versus 35% in BANES).

Also 85% of pupils feel their achievements are recognized at school (48% in BANES). 82% of pupils (64% in BANES) think that St Mary's takes bullying seriously. The least positive difference highlighted below will be a focus for continuing work at school.
