

Little Oaks


Phew what a scorcher!

I hope they all enjoyed the experience"











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


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Year 1

Class 3 have also participated in BANES Scooter Training - a practical lesson where all children had the opportunity to develop their knowledge and skills learning through fun and games.




Year 4

School Lunches

Please can we ask for all lunch orders for the first week back be ordered by midnight on Wednesday 28th August 2024.

We are pleased to inform you St John's Foundation will again be funding school dinners for the foreseeable future, therefore EVERY pupil in Years Reception through to Year 6 are entitled to a school dinner free of charge.

Orders must be placed by midnight Wednesday for the following week – if no order is placed, you will be required to provide your child with a packed lunch.

The current menu is now on Parent Pay through to the October holiday so you may book the whole term in advance should you wish.



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School Absence and Penalties.

We bring to your attention, the DfE have produced a new National Framework for Penalty Notices for school absences when a child has missed 10 or more sessions (5 days) for unauthorised reasons.

- From 19th August 2024, the fine for school absences across the country will rise to £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days.
- In the case of repeated fines, if a parent receives a second fine for the same child within any three-year period, this will be charged at the higher rate of £160.
- Fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other
 action like a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.
- If you're prosecuted and attend court because your child hasn't been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500.

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This Summer B&NES Council is pleased to offer free family cycle training in Midsomer Norton at Free Rangers Forest School Nursery.

This one to one course is designed to instruct the lead family member how to shepherd the group with road safety tactics. It also aims to improve children's cycle skills and road awareness while having fun with parents! The first hour will introduce basic cycle skills and will take place under a barn. Then, the group will have activities on a cycle tane and carefully selected local junctions under guidance of our instructor.





There is no minimum age but to attend this course, all riders must be able to ride a bike (set off, pedal, slow down and stop). If required, we can offer bike & helmet loans free of charge.
