Little Acorns



During our first term, Little Acorns have been learning all about themselves and each other in our topic 'I am Special'. Our new members of Little Acorns have settled in well, and the older children have been great at helping their new friends. We have spent time getting to know each other, building relationships, and learning the nursery promises and routines. We have particularly enjoyed spending time outside on the school field, performing our Harvest song '5 Little Apples' and engaging in circle times together. We are super proud of all of the children, what a great first term!







Little Oaks

Reception Class have been enjoying the sun shine and learning in the wooded area outside our classroom. They have been acting out scenes from our story- 'Polar bear polar bear what can you hear?' and making the noises of all the different animals!

They have also been loving our music lessons where they are leaning to play steady beats or make noise patterns with their instruments. This ties in with our maths lessons linked to making patterns.

They have now learnt 20 phonemes in Little Wandle phonics lessons and are starting to read these in words and spot them in their phonics book that they bring home each week. Thank you for your continuing support with this. It has been a great term focusing on our 'This is me' topic! The children have settled so well and got to know their peers and the teaching staff quickly. They all are enjoying school and feel safe and settled in their new class.

Class 1 had a visit from a firefighting crew and they even brought their fire engine. It was really exciting. We learnt all about what firefighters do and looked at the uniform they have to wear to protect. We looked at the equipment they carry on the fire truck and we were even able to have a go using the hose which was great fun. Class 2 have been learning about living things and their habitats in science this term! They have explored different minibeasts that live in our local habitat and created graphs and charts to reflect the population of different minibeasts in different habitats.

Nasal Flu Vaccinations

The School Nursing Team will be onsite on the 2nd November to carry out annual flu vaccinations. This is a simple, quick, painless nasal spray. The vaccine can only be given with parental consent so we ask all parents to complete the online permission form at the link previously emailed to all parents.

Please ensure you complete your child's consent **48 working hours** before your school session to ensure your child receives their vaccination.

and includes details about the small number of children for whom the nasal vaccine is not appropriate. The nasal spray vaccine contains a very small amount of purified porcine gelatine as

an essential ingredient to keep it stable and able to work. For those who may not accept medicines or vaccines that contain porcine gelatine, a flu vaccine injection is available. Since the programme was introduced, most children offered the vaccine in schools have had the immunisation.

A moment in St Mary's History.....



Green Parlour Tin Chapel - 1878

As many of you know, our current school building was built in 1901 but the school's history dates back much further from a time when lessons were held at Writhlington Primitive Methodist Chapel on Manor Road and prior to that the Green Parlour Tin Chapel, pictured here in 1878!

At the turn of the Century, local residents 'carried' the Tin Chapel down the road from Green Parlour to the site behind the Primitive Methodist Chapel and it remained in use until the 1980's. In fact, some members of our school community even remember attending Sunday School in the Tin Chapel !

Daily records dating back to the late 19th Century still exist and remain stored in archives. We have decided to share some of these records with you on our termly newsletters:

Oct 1902:

The managers of the school held their quarterly meeting on the 9th October. School was visited by the Rev A Ramsay and J. G. Walton Esquire who tested the registers . Work of the school has been according to time table. Rather thin attendance as a fresh case of mumps reported. Cold winds and weather resulted in several cases of illness and mumps was prevalent resulting in an epidemic lasting for the month of October and into November.

Commenced the gathering and starting exercises to all girls above Stand III.

October 1937:

We are picking, digging up and selling the garden produce. Boys should not attend woodwork this week and girls should not attend cookery classes.

September 1941:

Visit of Nurse Snowe to inspect the children's heads: 37 Writhlington Children inspected 28 Evacuees inspected 14 L.C.C evacuees inspected 17 Country Evacuees inspected
