Needle	A thin metal object in which thread or cotton is used with to sew
Pin	A thin metal sharp object used to secure objects in place when sewing
Stitch	A single turn or loop made by the needle and thread

Fastenings: a device that closes or secures something.

1.Velcro – a fastener for clothes or other items, consisting of two strips of thin plastic sheet, one covered with tiny loops and the other with tiny flexible hooks, which adhere when pressed together and can be separated when pulled apart.

Zip - a device consisting of two flexible strips of metal or plastic with interlocking projections closed or opened by pulling a slide along them, used to fasten garments, bags, and other items.

Snap fastener (popper) - a pair of interlocking discs, made out of a metal or plastic, commonly used in place of traditional buttons to fasten clothing and for similar purposes. A circular lip under one disc fits into a groove on the top of the other, holding them fast until a certain amount of force is applied.

Hook and eye closure -

consists of a metal hook, commonly made of flattened wire bent to the required shape, and an eye (or "eyelet") of the same material into which the hook fits.

Magnetic clasps - They are easy to hook together because the magnets are attracted to each other but they won't come apart easily because the magnets are so strong. This could be done with magnetic strips too. As long as the North and South poles are facing each other they will snap / attract and close.

Button - a fastener that joins two pieces of fabric together by slipping through a loop or by sliding through a buttonhole.


